The problem is that here in my town, there aren't any resources available for me to be able to dedicate myself to this science. A few days ago, I discovered that there is a small observatory in my town, but it is private and not public. I decided to go to the house of the man who owns the observatory to ask him about how it functions and if he could show it to me.






There in his house, the man told me about how he built the observatory with his own hands and by his own means. It is situated on "Calle Trafalgar" (Trafalgar Street), in Guadix (province of Granada), Spain.

The man's name is Dr. José López Gómez, a professor of molding and casting who is now retired. From a very young age, Dr. José has shared the same interests as me. His first toy was a telescope that his parents gave him as a birthday present. As he grew, his passion for astronomy became greater and greater. However, his dream was not just to be an astronomy hobbyist; his dream was to build his own observatory, which he did in his free time and financed out of his own personal funds.

The first step was to design it, create the structure of the dome, for which he bought 1,000 metres of flat connecting bars. When it was finished, a large crane lifted the dome to place it on the base, which he also designed, located on the roof of his house. It took 12 years to finish the project.

Once the structure was made, he completed all of the electrical work and mounted his own telescope. The observatory, made of aluminium and heat insulation, measures three metres in diameter.





According to Dr. José, the only things he bought were the optics and the mirror for the telescope. The rest of the pieces were custom-made in the town's workshops. The assembly process was expensive and toilsome, but satisfactory. As such, his project ended. He had completed his dream. From that moment, given that he was already retired, he decided to dedicate himself entirely to his passion, astronomy.

Since he was young Dr. José has been part of the astronomical association of Sabadell, for about 40 years more or less, and with that group he has visited many different observatories, both national and international, and he has been to many conferences given by astronomers here in Spain. He has also given a few small conferences about this topic.

Nowadays, Dr. José goes up to his observatory every night and spends 4 or 5 hours contemplating the wonders of the universe. He searches for nebulas, comets, and stars, and he studies celestial bodies.

This is the story of Dr. José López Gómez, an astrophile who has fulfilled his dream of fully dedicating his life to astronomy, even though he didn't study this science.

Much like him, I also want to dedicate my life to astronomy. I have learned from him that even though there aren't many means available here where we live, even if it takes a long time and a lot of effort, anything can be accomplished when one wishes to do so.

Astronomy and I seemed like an incompatible match, but after hearing this story I believe that everything can be accomplished, and that is what I am going to attempt.
